COMMISSIONER'S LETTER

Our fall 2008 season is well underway, with 1,300 players, ranging in age from 4 through 18 years of age, and over 100 teams, playing soccer every Saturday through mid-November, on the Crestmoor and Parkside soccer fields in San Bruno, and for our under-12 and older age group teams, on soccer fields in other Northern Peninsula communities. Forty players also participate in our league's VIP soccer program, giving children throughout San Mateo County with physical or mental disabilities the chance to play soccer on Saturdays during the season. And 90 under-5 age group players play soccer every Monday night through mid-October at the Crestmoor soccer fields.

And if you walk around our busiest practice fields (Crestmoor, Parkside, Grundy, Monte Verde, San Bruno City Park) during the week--especially on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings—it's really something to see the hundreds of kids out practicing with their coaches and family members in tow. I know that when my kids were younger, they enjoyed the practices as much as the games and I hope that your children look forward to getting out during the week to practice their soccer.

As we watch our children's practices and games, let's make sure we fully support them by offering encouragement and demonstrating good sportsmanship. We all serve as role models for our children, so let's make sure we are positive ones—applaud good plays by your child's team as well as the opposing team. And if a child makes a mistake, just remember that it's part of the learning process—encourage their effort and tell them that it's okay. Remember that our children are the ones playing soccer, not us. And let's fully support our coaches and referees. They're parents just

like us and they volunteer their time to help make our children's youth soccer experience a positive one. They need our support too, so let's not be sideline coaches and referees. Plus as a parent, it's no fun to stand next to someone who behaves that way during a game!

Let's also be reminded that everyone you see pitching in and helping out with our program during the season is a volunteer—coaches and assistant coaches, referees, team parents, people helping with field set-up and takedown, people working in the snack bar, people who help staff our information/support tent on the upper Crestmoor field, people who clean the bathrooms, people who pick up garbage and dog messes. And they do this to ensure that all of the kids who participate in our program have the best possible soccer experience, as others before them have done. So please treat our volunteers with the utmost respect, and let them know that you appreciate the role they play. And by the same token, you can let the league know where improvement is needed, or if a volunteer may not be living up to the high standards of our program. You can do so by talking to any of our league's board members or by leaving word on our 873-AYSO message center.

As the season goes on, we'll continue to work hard to ensure that our program truly benefits our players, their families and the communities we serve. We want our program to be much more than just an athletic program--we want it to promote the positive development of our youth and be a source of much family fun and pride. Please look for ways you can become more involved in our program and in supporting your children. For there's nothing more valuable to our children than our time.

The *18th Annual Turkey Tournament* is fast approaching. Kids, have you heard about the tournament? If not, ask your coach about it. This is a highly successful entry level tournament that has been sponsored by San Bruno AYSO for the past seventeen years. Talk to your coach and see how many members of your team want to join in the fun.

The tournament is held over the Thanksgiving weekend. The games are played on Saturday and Sunday. We have AYSO teams from as far south as Saratoga that come and join us for this exciting event. Some of the cities other than San Bruno that have engaged in this premier tournament are: Burlingame, Brisbane, Concord, Daly City, La Honda, Millbrae, Pacifica, and San Mateo.

All U10 players will receive a participation medal. The players on U12 and U14 teams that come in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, & 4th will receive medals.

All coaches in these divisions have already received an invitation letter in their folders at the tent on the upper Crestmoor field. Come see us at the tent if you have any questions.

Join the Fun!

What if I have kids who want to keep playing soccer after the fall 2008 season?

For our U-10 and older age group players, there are a number of opportunities to keep playing soccer after the fall AYSO season ends. We'd encourage any interested age group coaches to consider putting together a team to participate in the November 29 and 30 **Turkey Tournament in San Bruno** (see additional information on the tournament in this newsletter) and several other area tournaments held in May of each year. In between November and May, your team can play in the **Pacific Coast Spring Soccer League** for U-10 through U-19 age group teams. Games are played on Sundays from Sunday, March 1st thru Sunday, May 9th, against teams (primarily AYSO) along the peninsula, from Daly City to as far south as San Jose. All San Bruno-based teams would play their home games at the Crestmoor soccer fields with the support of our local referees. Information on the league is generally available in November, with team applications and fees (\$150 per team) due by the end of January 2009. Teams who participate in the league generally start practicing in February.

In terms of Spring 2009 area soccer tournaments, there are several great options in our area. The **Pacifica Fog Cup Classic Soccer Tournament** will be held over the weekend of May 2nd and 3rd, 2009. Information on this tournament should be available on the Pacifica AYSO website in January 2009. The tournament offers U-10, U-12 and U-14 age group divisions.

In addition, the **Concord Cup Soccer Tournament** will be held, May 16-17, 2009, for U-10 through U-19 age group teams. Tournament information will be available on the "Concord Cup" website in January 2009.

Finally, the **Davis AYSO World Cup Soccer Tournament** is a very popular tournament for U-10 through U-19 age group AYSO teams, held in late May each year, over Memorial Day weekend (May 24-26, 2009). Tournament applications will be available in February 2008 from the Davis AYSO website. Many of the age groups sell out, so turn your applications and fees in as early as possible in February.

Whatever soccer avenues you'd like to pursue, if you don't want to put a team together by yourself, try partnering with another coach (or two) who you'd envision working well with. If you don't want to keep coaching after the fall season ends, but you have players who want to keep playing soccer, then submit their names to your age group coordinator or to someone at the league's Crestmoor soccer field tent on any game day Saturday.

COACH'S CORNER

OCTOBER / NOVEMBER 2008 – Larry Dillard

For all you COACHES, my first thought is to thank you for your generosity. Without all 170+ of you there wouldn't be a season nor over 1200 kids playing and practicing soccer throughout the week. This program works due to your dedication to the families in our community and your observation of AYSO's philosophies. I'm glad to see that as coaches, you are representing the ideal that while we play the game to win, winning is not everything but honoring the game is which includes respect for other players, coaches and the referees.

As coaches we need to extend a big thank you to all the wonderful volunteer referees who dedicate their time to be out on the field with our kids. It's important to recognize the referees as without them, there would be no game, just practice. As a coach I know that they do their best to call a fair match in a positive way for our kids and they deserve our respect and thanks for effort they put in.

As we continue through the Fall 2008 Soccer Season, I'd like to support all coaches in staying positive, instructive and encouraging with the players. We're now past the half way point where it would be a good time to let the players handle everything during the match except substitutions. Sit back, relax and simply observe the game (as a coach should do). Take time to marvel at the skills being executed on the field, taking stock that you've most likely been the one to encourage or train the player in those skills. Giving each player the skills and confidence to execute and experiment with new ones is what we're about.

After each game or practice, keep acknowledging players by identifying a positive skill (or two) for each player which they've accomplished. Doing so you'll set an example as a positive team member and provide the confidence for all players which is needed for their success. This will also give players something to look forward to at the next wrap up session.

Now for the administrative stuff. Player evaluations sheets have been placed in your mail slots. Please pick them up, take 4 minutes during the game and jot down the player rating. The ratings can be returned to my mail box. Providing a true reflection of the players rating will help us next year to balance to the teams, providing for evenly matched games.

In the summer of 2008 two boys' soccer teams from Germany stayed in San Bruno. The first team that came out was from Andernach (Rhineland-Palatinate) and they stayed with participants in AYSO during 4th of July weekend. The second team that came was from Westerstede (Lower Saxony) at the end of July early August. Both teams homestayd with people of San Bruno AYSO. The teams were taken to San Francisco, Santa Cruz, and many other various places. Hello I am **Katryna Dillard** and I am 15 years old going to Germany next year through San Bruno

My family and I hosted 4 people from the second German team that came to San Bruno. We hosted two boys that were brothers and their parents. One of the boys was 18 and the other 16. They both ate a LOT of food. No joke they just kept eating and never got full. When we first met the team at a welcome dinner my first impression was that they were tall, and I was hosting the two tallest out of the whole group!! They also almost all had blonde hair and blue eyes. On the first night the

girls really didn't talk to any of the boys, but as the days went on we talked more and more to them. Marwin, one of the boys I hosted, was really good at speaking English so most of the girls talked to him.

On Sunday the boys had a game and some of the girls cultural exchange team came and cheered them on. When the boys got to the field they thought there would be locker rooms, but there weren't so they just changed in the open. Afterwards there was a BBQ and the Germans learned the game of horseshoes. That night we went to Sea Bowl and had a bowling tournament. It was a lot of fun even though the girls were with girls and Germans with Germans. Monday the team went to meet the Mayor of San Bruno and then we went off to Alcatraz for a couple of hours. We made our family lasagna for dinner. Tuesday the team went to Six Flags Discovery Kingdom, for a very long day, while the adults went for wine tasting. Tuesday was when the German boys and American girls started to mingle. Most of the Germans had a lot of fun on all the rides. I remember watching Alex, one of the Germans, get off a ride and look like he was going to throw up, but he insisted he was fine. Towards the end of the day most of the boys were dead tired but that's why there were vans, so they could sleep on the way home (too bad I gave one of the German drivers wrong directions). I am one of the older girls going to Germany and can give pretty good directions, so when we would go places I would be the drivers 2nd GPS (since they already had one).

On Wednesday the team went to Santa Cruz, but one of my boys and his family made a stop at Stanford to get an apple computer. The family staying with me had a van that they were driving so instead of going home right away from Santa Cruz we went to camping grounds where my Uncle, Aunt, and other family members were staying. We stayed till about ten and they made smores and my uncle learned about beer and driving ages. On Thursday I stayed at home, but the team took the train to San Francisco and shopped(they went to Hollister, but the adults didn't like it because it was too loud). When they came back, my brother, the two German boys, and I went out and had Chinese food; the adults had a party. On Friday they went to the Exploratorium. I think the boys

weren't happy to be going to a museum, but when they found out they could play around they were happy. Then they had a game and all the girls were cheering for the Germans and calling out their names. (and yes they changed on the field again.) There was a pizza party for them because they were supposed to be leaving, but they ending up staying until Sunday night. Saturday was a rest day in the morning and then some of the boys went shopping at Tanforan. Some of the boys came home with us and then five of them and I went to Malibu to meet up with others and play golf. It was so much fun.

I loved meeting and talking to the Germans and they made the bathroom smell good after they out their hair gel in. I miss them a lot and can't wait to see them again. They were very kind, polite, and clean people. I wished they had stayed longer. I was so sad when they left because we had finally started talking to them and some nights I would play wii with the boys and Kai, the younger brother, got very good at wii golf. I hope to keep in touch with them and have a lot of funny when I go to Germany.
